Research and Planning

Evaluations submitted by members at our fall workshop, winter workshop, and annual conference in the 2015-16 school year showed that a majority of members wanted more PD focused on social media. In response, the WSPRA board developed two strategies to address the need for social media learning.

- Social media would be a recurring theme in all PD events in 2016-17. Knowing that some
 members were already advanced social media users and others were barely familiar with the
 most basic platforms, we decided to offer two threads differentiated by level of experience,
 skill, and knowledge in social media practices.
- The board resolved to model excellent and engaging social media as an organization. We
 recruited a new board member with cutting edge social media skills as our Vice-President of
 Communications. She developed a robust social media plan that demonstrated best practices.

Implementation

Strategy 1: Professional Development

- The WSPRA fall workshop was devoted to social media. (See attached flyer and agenda.) The keynote by a social media expert from a local PR/Marketing firm introduced social media basics and strategy; followed by two breakouts:
 - Social Media 101 (presentation attached)
 - o Social Media 201
- The WSPRA winter workshop also focused on social media. (See attached agenda.) The <u>keynote</u> covered the necessity of having a social media policy in public agencies and discussed how to measure success in social media engagement. (See handouts and examples <u>here</u>.) We again offered two differentiated breakouts:
 - Content Creation and Curation for social media novices and one-person shops
 - o Facebook Live for more advanced social media users

- The annual conference had a focus broader than solely social media, but the social media thread
 carried through in the presentation by the Highline Public Schools communications team,
 sharing their use of electronic tools to engage a diverse audience. (Presentation attached.) A
 significant portion of the presentation was devoted to Highline's robust social media presence.
 (The presentation departed from the PowerPoint into a live demonstration of Highline's social
 media accounts.)
- WSPRA has had the privilege of sharing some of this PD with other chapters. Highline presented
 at the Wisconsin-SPRA fall conference and the OSPRA spring conference in April. The OSPRA
 presentation (attached) included an expanded segment on social media.

Strategy 2: Modelling Best Practices

- Under the direction of VP Communications Melissa Laramie, WSPRA's presence on <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Twitter</u> went from nominal to exemplary.
- WSPRA has hosted a series of Twitter chats to model and increase engagement. The most recent chat was held the week following the annual conference. The purpose was to reinforce our learning and share ideas from the conference.

Evaluation

Strategy 1: Professional Development

- Attendance at all chapter PD events was significantly higher than in past years. (See attached attendance rosters.)
 - o Fall workshop attendance: 46 (unusually high given that the location was in less-populated Eastern Washington.)
 - Winter workshop attendance: 65
 - Annual conference attendance: 84
- Evaluations on workshops and annual conference were strongly positive. (See attached evaluation data.)
