The video is being used at the state level by the Wisconsin Department of Instruction as part of its career pathways initiatives, broadening awareness of opportunities for students with IEPs. Additionally, four educational service agencies across the state are incorporating the video into their Youth Apprenticeship programs, expanding its impact. At the local level, school district counselors are utilizing the video in career counseling sessions and sharing it directly with families of students with IEPs, helping them explore the possibilities available to This strategic distribution ensures the video serves as an effective their children. communication tool, reaching a diverse audience through multiple channels. By using storytelling to illustrate real student success, the video engages viewers emotionally and provides a clear, compelling message about the benefits of Youth Apprenticeships. It also strengthens advocacy efforts by showcasing the positive impact of these programs on students, families, and the workforce. In a short time, the video has significantly raised awareness of career pathways for students with IEPs. The schools featured in the video were part of a pilot program, and its success has sparked interest from more than 30 additional districts looking to develop similar opportunities for their students. As a result, the video has helped drive meaningful conversations and actions,

ensuring more students with IEPs have access to programs that empower them to succeed in both school and future careers.
